We tend to be drawn to outlier evaluations, especially when they are negative, and spend an inordinate amount of time obsessing over them. There are faculty members who no longer even look at any student evaluations because of the fear and impact of those negative



responses (not a good practice I would ever advocate). So, how can we use mid-semester evaluations to effectively inform our course design by drawing on general student agreement about what's working, not working, and can be improved over the rest of the semester? The answer, try a Small Group Instructional Diagnosis (SGID).
